


Conditionals (page 1)

A conditional phrase is a condition of something happening. Conditionals talk about both real and unreal situations in the present and future tense.



If it rains, I use my umbrella.

If we play a game, it's monopoly.

If I need help, my mom will always help me.

My brother bandages me up when I scrape my knees.

I will buy myself a new mountain bike when I earn enough.

I will not go hiking unless you go with me.

I won't have enough money unless you split it with me.

I want to wait until tomorrow, in case you decide to go.

In case someone gets hurt, we should take the first aid kit.

I will help pay your rent, providing you spend time looking for a job.

Our team can win, provided there are no injuries.

You can play that game as long as you're quiet.

You can use my computer on condition that you respect my privacy.

You'll have to pay whether you show up or not.

Conditionals (page 2)

A conditional phrase is a condition of something happening. Conditionals talk about both real and unreal situations in the present and future tense.

Conditional phrases often include the words: if, when, in case, unless, provided, whether, as long as, on condition. Underline the conditionals in the following sentences.

Conditionals (page 7)

A conditional phrase is a condition of something happening. Conditionals talk about both real and unreal situations in the present and future tense.

A zero conditional is about the present time and describes something that is always true.

For example: If you heat ice, it melts.

No matter what it always happens - it's always true. It's a zero conditional statement.

Conditionals (page 8)

A conditional phrase is a condition of something happening. Conditionals talk about both real and unreal situations in the present and future tense.

A first conditional is about the future time and describes something that is likely to happen.

For example: You will pass the test if you study regularly. Finish these first conditionals using "if" or "when".

Conditionals (page 9)

A conditional phrase is a condition of something happening. Conditionals talk about both real and unreal situations in the present and future tense.

A second conditional is about the future time and describes something that is hypothetical or might happen.

For example: If I practiced, I would play better.
