A sentence is a group of words that expresses a complete thought, asks a question, or issues a command. A sentence usually contains a subject (noun) and predicate (verb), and must express a complete thought.

A compound sentence has two complete thoughts joined by a conjunction such as and, but, or, nor.

Examples of compound sentences:

- The dog ran and the cat purred.
- The black dog ran and the grey cat purred. [Added the adjectives "black" and "grey".]
- The black dog ran swiftly and the grey cat purred loudly.
 [Added the adverb "swiftly" and "loudly".]

Each sentence above is a compound sentence because the two ends of the sentence (split at the conjunction) can stand alone as a complete thought. Write if each group of words below is a compound sentence or a simple sentence.
