

A gerund is a word that acts as a noun, and ends in "-ing". A gerund can be used as the subject, object or complement in a sentence. All gerunds end in "-ing", but not all words that end in "-ing" are gerunds.

Underline words that are used as gerunds (like nouns). Remember, some words that end in "-ing" are used as verbs or modifiers instead of as a noun.
